• We built strong ties with a local company which donated us 8 recycle bins for plastic and 3 for paper.
















----- Comparison between Croatia and Cyprus


Question 7

The footprint calculator —Comparison between Croatia and Cyprus


Question 8


The footprint calculator — Comparison between Croatia and Cyprus Question 9



Most Croatian students spend less than 60€ per month on clothes and footwear, while most Cypriot students spend more than 60 € per month on clothing and footwear.




67% of the Cypriot students and 77% of the Croatian students spend less than 110€ on free time activities and culture.

Question 11




Most students in Croatia spend less than 30€ for furniture and household appliances. In Cyprus, the students spend less than 80 € per month. In conclusion, on average we do not waste a lot of money on furniture and home appliances. This may be due to the durability of the products or even their price.

In Croatia, the great majority of students spend less than 70 € per month on food, whereas the majority of students in Cyprus spend less than 90 € per month. To sum up, the majority of students in both countries spend less than 70 € per month on food from restaurants, canteens and takeaways.

Conclusion: Each Cypriot student on average contributes 2,65 tonnes of CO2 more than each Croatian student. We should not forget, through, that the only means of public transport we can use is the bus. Also, we need to use a plane when we want to travel. The result, we believe, is partly due to these facts. A lot of effort has been made through various campaigns to raise awareness about the disastrous effects of climate change. It seems, however, that most Cypriots haven't realized that yet, so the effort has to be continued. Climate change is a reality.
